Roger Woolfords Depositions ab. Land called Wolfford
By Virtue of a Commission Act of the High Court of Chancery to us the Subscribers
Directed to Examine Evidence relating to the bounds of a certain Tract of Land lying
in Somerset County containing Seven hundred Acres called Wolfford belonging to
Mr. Roger Woolford of Dorchester County who do hereby certify that on the 26th day
of March Anno Dom 1713. came before us Mr. John Forman, Sen. and made oath
upon the holy Evangelist, and Mr. Lion Dowwood, Sen. who did solemnly attest & affirm
which is what passes for an oath from the people called Quakers. That whereas
Formerly there was a debate concerning a marked Tree standing upon the West Side of a
small Gut which divided the Tract of Land called Wolfford belonging to Mr. Roger
Woolford Sen. containing Seven hundred Acres from a Tract of Land which was formerly
surveyed for Capt. William Thomas lying on the North Side of Monocan River in Somerset
County upon a Warrant of Survey, which was made about forty years ago or
thereabouts) to run a Divisional Line between the said Roger Woolfords Land called
Woolford and Capt. William Thomas Land which said Tree was shewn unto the Surveyor
Mr. Francis Jenkins by John Ruggwey and Owen Magrah who were then present
when the aforesaid Land was first surveyed for the aforesaid Woolford and saw the Tree
when it was first marked, which is an old Gum Stump rotten on the Easternmost Side
of the said Stump. Where we have caused a squared Cedar post marked with three
notches on each square to be affixed y. to ascertain the post only which y. said Tree stood
