

I take the liberty to bring them to your attention, and ask that either you will have the goodness to send to the Provost Marshal's Department of this District (1st Md.) general orders as to the required mode of procedure, or special instructions or directions to myself touching the case brought to attention—Coveys.

This case properly adjusted would be a precedent, and definite action in regard to it, or any other well known and defiant case would deter the Orphans' Court of this county, from longer being the agents by whom the wishes of the people, as shown in the vote adopting the new Constitution of the State, are by them as completely defeated in the case of minors, as though the old slave constitution was a power in the State, and the new was only as Covey declares it a "bogus affair."
