*Sir*:—I made application for my boy, a slave before the New Constitution of Maryland was passed, to Mrs. Diffindaffer, of Abbingdon, and she told me she could not or would not give up the boy as he was bound to her before this New Constitution was passed. He was a slave to her previous to this, and therefore is trying to take advantage of this apprenticing of my Son. I therefore respectfully submit my case to you, knowing that I will meet with nothing but justice at your hands.
