Daniel and your sister Caroline are both enjoying good health at present and send their love to you. They are all together yet, the sale went on last Wednesday. They are going to stay with him until he leaves.

Charles Reese has been in the army ever since April, he is in the Thirty-ninth Maryland Regiment, his sister receives letters from him every two weeks, he has been in two battles and not yet hurt, he is with Grant, near Petersburg.
