

tion, by which copies of papers deposited or filed therein, and all official acts and decisions may be authenticated.

SEC. 14. The State Superintendent shall be allowed the amount expended for traveling and personal expenses in making official visits as required by law, also all necessary contingent expenses for books, postage and stationery, fuel and light, printing of blanks and other matters essential to the organization of his office, and not otherwise provided for in this Law, said amounts to be paid by the State Treasurer quarterly upon warrant of Comptroller.

CHAPTER IV.—SCHOOL DIRECTORS.

THEIR APPOINTMENT, POWERS AND DUTIES.

SECTION 1. On the first Monday of June, 1865, there shall be appointed by the State Board of Education one person of literary and scientific attainments, and of skill and experience in the art of teaching, to be Director of Schools in the City of Baltimore, and one of like qualifications for each County, to hold office for four years, or until their successors have been appointed, and to perform such duties as herein are provided, or the General Assembly or Board of Education may from time to time direct.

SEC. 2. Whenever the State Superintendent of Public Instruction is satisfied that a City or County Director has persistently neglected his duties, he may suspend him from the duties of his office, and withhold his order for the payment of the whole or any portion of such Director's salary, until the case has been acted upon by the State Board of Education.
