

guages and Mathematics, sufficient to prepare youth to enter any one of the State Colleges, under control of the Council of the University of Maryland. The terms of admission to the High Schools, shall be determined by the State Board of Education.

SEC. 2. Whenever the Board of School Commissioners of any two Counties shall think it expedient, they may, with the consent of the Board of Education, unite their funds and establish at some convenient and central location, a Union High School which shall be free to youth of both Counties.

Union High Schools.

SEC. 3. Such Union High Schools shall be governed by a joint Committee consisting of the County Directors and two members of each County Board, and shall be subject to the visitation and examination equally of the County Director of each County uniting to establish the School.

How governed.

SEC. 4. The moneys known as the Academic fund, consisting of an annual appropriation to each County of twelve hundred dollars, and now divided among several Academies, or paid to the School Commissioners for the General School Fund shall constitute together with such other donations as from time to time may be made, or annual appropriations by the County Board, a High School Fund, and be used by the Board of School Commissioners, to aid in paying the salary of the Principal and other teachers of the High School.

How supported.

SEC. 5. Suitable buildings for the High School together with a residence for the Principal, to be used also as a Boarding-house for students from distant sections of the County, shall be erected at the cost of the County, and paid for by General County Tax, provided, however, that before proceeding to locate the High School, the Board of
