Question. From how near a point at any time did you see

the flag?

Answer. I saw Harry Gilmore when he brought it up, I think it was seventy-five feet. He came from the direction of Baltimore.

Question. You stated that you could not see the flag very

distinctly did you not?

Answer. I could see the Maryland Coat of Arms distinctly.

I am not sure it had the Palmetto or not.

Question. Who was with Gilmore when he came up with the flag?

Answer. I think he came up alone.

Question. Where were you when the flag was put up?

Answer. In our armory, about fifty yards from the hotel.

Question. Who put the flag up?

Answer. Harry Gilmore, John Clark and Edwin Hook.

Question. Were you in the parlor at that time?

Answer. No.

Question. Were you admitted in?

Answer. At that time we had to be particular, we did not know what they were about and we had to look out for ourselves; I was satisfied if anything happened there might be trouble and one way to avoid it was to keep away. I counselled our men not to go there.

Question. Did you at any time during that period make

application to go into that parlor?

Answer. No.

Question. Were not members of your company over at the

hotel and continually passing in and out?

Answer. Yes. I think four or five, they boarded there at the time, we could not feed them all and we sent a few over there to be boarded.

Direct Examination Resumed.

Question. Is the Harry Gilmore, of whom you have spoken, the same who has been since so notorious as the guerilla and robber?

Answer. Yes. Question. You say "they watched us, and we watched

them;" was your company in hostility to the United States?

Answer. No.

Question. Was the company doing any acts of hostility to the United States, or in any manner favoring the rebellion at that time?

Answer. No.

Cross-examination Resumed.

Question. Where was Mr. Grason at the time this flag was put up at the hotel?
