Answer. On the 20th, 21st and 22nd, there was no flag on the hotel, unless it was put up on the evening of the 22nd; we called it the rebel flag; I believe it was the Maryland State flag.

Question. Did it represent anything else except the coat of

arms of Maryland?

Answer. I was not near enough to see it.

Question. You saw nothing of the Stars and Stripes, did you? Luswer, I doubted in at the times.

Answer. No.

When the company was marching to and from Baltimore, had they a flag?

Answer. I don't know whether they had or not.

Question. Do you know of the company having the custody or transportation of arms for the purpose of arming persons against the United States?

Answer. No.

Question. Do you know of Mr. Grason having given any enemies of the country, any counsel or aid at any time, or expressed any desire for the triumph of the armies of the United States?

Answer. I do not; except that he appeared to act as counsel for the company in a case where a man was brought before me, with the request that I should commit him to jail; I was then acting as magistrate; which I done.

Question. Upon what charges was he arrested and com-

mitted to jail?

Answer. I made the entry that he was found under suspicious circumstances by the Baltimore county Horse Guards, and committed to jail.

Question. Do you remember whether he was a soldier of

the United States?

Answer. He represented himself as such.

Question. What time was that?

Answer. It was the Monday following the 19th of April. Question. Do you recollect the suspicious things with

which he was charged?

Answer. I don't recollect any conversation that took place on that day; but I know from the entry I have made, and from the impression made upon my mind, that he was found lurking a good ways from his camp; he was brought up by Hopkins Hunt, a private member of the Guards.
