Question by the Committee Did you ever see him before? Answer. No: Mr. Griffith said he saw the rebels burn the bridges.

## Cross-examination Resumed.

Question. Do you know what became of Mr. Griffith after the examination at Col. Woolley's office?

Answer. No.

Question. You say Mr. Grason was on his porch, was he sitting in his chair?

Answer. I think he was standing: I think there was company there. I overheard him talking.

The examination of this witness was here concluded.

JOHN T. ENSOR, called as a witness for the contestant, being duly sworn, testified as follows:

Question. State your name, residence and business?

Answer. My name is John T. Ensor, I reside at Towson-town, and am State's attorney for Baltimore county.

Question. How long have you known Mr. Grason?

Answer. Seven (7) years I believe.

Question. Do you know anything of the circumstances of a military company in which he was Lieutenant, being in any service about the 19th of April, 1861, and a week or two subsequent?

Answer. I know Mr. Grason was second Lieutenant of a military company called the Baltimore County Horse Guards, and that this company from the 19th or 20th of April was apparently doing military duty for some two or three weeks.

Question. Was Mr. Grason with them during any portion

of that time, if so, in what capacity?

Question. I have seen Mr. Grason with them, and acting as one of the Lieutenants in the company.

Question. What sort of service did the company render,

and what acts do, during that time?

Answer. The first thing I know of them doing, I saw them on their road to Baltimore on the 20th of April, I think Saturday; I saw them going in that direction. I saw them again, I think, on the following day, Sunday, or Monday, in Towsontown. They were engaged, as far as I know, in picketing the road between Cockeysville and Baltimore: engaged in that kind of service for about two or three weeks.

Question. What enemy was there at either end of that

picket line, to be guarded against?

Answer. At that time, if I mistake not, General Stuart and General Trimble had military possession of the city of
