Question. Do you know where Mr. Grason was standing at the time the remark was made?

Answer. No. I don't know where he was at the precise

time; I saw him a few minutes before it was made.

Question. Could you say whether he heard theremark? Answer. I can't say whether Mr. Grason heard the remark or not.

Question. How long have you known Mr. Grason? Answer. Several years before the war, and since.

Question. Have you been frequently thrown in contact with him at Towsontown?

Answer. I have never been greatly in his company.

Question. How long have you been Treasurer of the county?

Answer. Next fall will be two (2) years.

Question. Prior to that time, did you hold an official position in Baltimore county?

Answer. Yes; I was County Commissioner for a little

upwards of three (3) years.

Question. Did your official duties call you frequently to Towsontown?

Answer. Yes.

Question. Do you know of any acts of hostility to the United States Government done by Mr. Mr. Grason, or of any expression of sympathy for the rebellion made by him? of cries b occupies again data mid squasto dos

Answer. No.

By the Committee.

Question by the Committee. - What were the names of the parties that Mr. Grason and Mr. Ensor represented?

Answer. Some called Mr. Grason's party rebels, and some

copperheads. Question by the Committee. - What was the name of Mr. Ensor's party?

Answer. The Union party.

Cross Examination resumed.

Question. What time was that?

Answer. The fall of 1863.

Question. You say some of the Union people called them Rebels, some Copperheads and some Democrats?

Answer. I never heard many people speak of them as Dem-

ocrats at that time. Question. Was there any party organization running independent?

Answer. I don't know whether they had any regular nomi-

nations; I never heard of any.
