Cross-examination.

Question. What boat was that?

Answer. I think it was the Steamer Chester.

Question. Between what points did she run?

Answer. Between Baltimore and the Eastern Shore.

Question. Where does Mr. Grason's father live?

Answer. I am not sure that I know. I think in Queen Anne's county.

Question. Did this boat stop at Queenstown?

Answer. Yes.

Question. Did you ever hear him, at any time, express sympathy for the Rebellion?

Answer. I never did.

Direct examination resumed.

Question. Did you ever hear him express himself in any way, in reference to matters political, since the outbreak of the rebellion?

Answer. I never have.

The examination of this witness was here concluded.

HENRY KONE, called as a witness for the contestant being duly sworn, testified as follow:

Question. What is your name, age, residence and occupa-

Answer. My name is Henry Kone, I am 58 years old, I reside at Towsontown, and am the keeper of the Court House there.

Question. Do you know Mr. Grason?

Answer. Yes. I have known him perhaps five (5) or six

(6) years.

Question. Have you known him, at any time, since the commencement of the present rebellion, to be in armed hostility to the United States or the lawful authorities thereof?

Answer. I saw him in April 1861, with the Baltimore County Horse Guards; I also saw him on the Saturday evening the company started to go down to Baltimore city. I met him on the pike.

Question. Was the company armed and in uniform at that

time?

Answer. Yes.

Question. About what time was that?

Answer. It was a Saturday evening in April 1861. I think

Mr. Grason was 2nd Lieutenant of the company.

Question. Did you see that company the following week? Answer. I never saw them in full company any more; I saw some ones of them on the pike, they had pickets out. They were sending dispatches up and down the road through Towsontown. The Headquarters was at Mr. Ady's Hotel.
