Question. Did you see any of the Towson Guards have that badge on?

Answer. Yes. One member had.

Question. How many men did you see with that badge on?

Answer. I don't know how many I saw. Every one of the company had them on and some who did not belong to the company. I think Dr. Thompson had one, he was surgeon, and had a device or motto of some kind.
