Answer. They did, when they left, previous to going to Baltimore; when they went to Baltimore, they had the Southern Rights badge pinned to their coats.

Question. When was it they went to Baltimore?

Answer. It was a little after the 19th of April; it was just before General Butler came to Baltimore.

Question. Did you see them when they started for Balti-

more?

Answer. Yes; I saw them start off.

Question. Did Mr. Grason go as an officer of the company

at that time?

Answer. Mr. Grason was a Lieutenant in the company, but whether he was with them or not, I can't say. I saw Mr. Grason at other times drilling there with them, about that time.

Question. How long did the company continue to drill and

perform military duty there?

Answer. Not long after the regiment of soldiers came to Cockeysville, from Pennsylvania.

Question. Do you know why they disbanded, or broke up?

Answer. I don't know.

Question. What other service did they render or perform besides going to Baltimore on the occasion you have spoken of?

Answer. They used to drill quite frequently near the court-

house there.

Question. Do you know whether they went on military service towards Cockeysville?

Answer. Yes.

Question. What was the character of the service rendered, did you understand from any public announcement made there?

Answer. Not to allow soldiers to go down that road.

Question. Was there any public announcement to that effect?

Answer. I do not know of any.

Question. Did you see any movements with reference to the flag at Towsontown at that time?

Answer. We had a flag there; I attended to the Union flag.

Question. Was it lowered at any time?

Answer. They were ordered to take it down.

Question. Was it taken down?

Answer. Yes.

Question. How long was it before it was raised again?

Answer. After the excitement got pretty well over it was raised again.

Question. State any circumstances that you remember in

connection with the raising of that flag again?

Answer. The ladies had it in their hands at that time; while they were endeavoring to raise the flag there was a
