The examination of this witness was here concluded.

THOMAS TAYLOR, called as a witness for the Contestant, being duly sworn, testified as follows:

Question. State your name, and residence?

Answer. My name is Thomas Taylor; I reside two (2) miles below Towsontown.

Question. Were you in the city of Baltimore on the 19th

and 20th of April, 1861?

Answer. Yes; I was there on the 20th of April.

Question. State briefly to the committee, what was the condition of things while you were there?

Answer. There was a good deal of excitement when I was

there.

Question. Were there men under arms, and on a war footing at that time?

Answer. Yes.

Question. For what purpose, or against what power, were those men under arms?

Answer. To the best of my knowledge, I do not know.

Question. Were you in Towsontown on either of those days?

Answer. Yes; I was in Towsontown on the 20th and 21st.

I think.

Question. Were there none under arms in Towsontown on these days? a thille vira pas ison bell innitionill

Answer. Yes.

Question. What were they?

Answer. The Baltimore County Horse Guards and some of the Towson Guards.

Question. For what purpose, or against what authority or power were they under arms?

Answer. I do not know positively.

Question. Did you hear any public announcement of their purpose?

Answer. No.

Question. From who did they receive their orders?

Answer. I dont know positively.

Question. Who were the officers of that company of Horse Guards?

Answer. Capt. Charles Ridgely of Hampton; 1st Lieut. John Merryman, of Hayfield; 2d. Lieut. Mr. Grason, I think; 3d Lieut. Mr. Carman.

Question. From whom did that company receive the orders

for movements at that time?

Answer. I dont know.

Question. Did you see any orders or dispatches brought to the head quarters of the company from any direction?
