

Question. Did you leave the flag staff or pole, when you went over to Mr. Ady's?

Answer. No. I went from the hall to Mr. Ady's and from there to the flag pole.

Question. Had the flag been raised at that time?

Answer. No.

Question. How long did you remain at Ady's?

Answer. Five (5) or ten (10) minutes.

Question. When you went back from Ady's had the flag been raised?

Answer. No.

Question. During the five (5) or ten (10) minutes that you were at Mr. Ady's, have you any recollection of seeing Mr. Grason there?

Answer. No.

Question. After you left Ady's and went to the flag pole, have you any recollection of seeing Mr. Grason?

Answer. No.

Question. At the time of the hissing and groning at Ady's where were you standing?

Answer. Some fifteen (15) feet from the pole; some fifty (50) yards from Mr. Ady's.

Question. Were you between the pole and Mr. Ady's porch?

Answer. I was near the centre of the pike.

Question. Were you nearer Ady's than the pole was?

Answer. Yes.

Question. When the groaning and hissing occurred, did you look over to the porch of Ady's Hotel?

Answer. No.

Question. How long was that groaning and hissing after you left Ady's Hotel?

Answer. Not longer than about ten (10) minutes.

Question. Did you hear any one hurra for Jeff Davis?

Answer. No.

Question. Did you hear any hurraing of any kind?

Answer. No. Only by us when we raised the flag.

Question. Upon what day was it that Capt. Ridegly told you that they were out under the orders of Governor Hicks?

Answer. On the Saturday before they left for Baltimore.

Question. Have you known Mr. Grason well, personally?

Answer. Yes. He is a near neighbor of mine, he lives about eighty (80) or hundred (100) yards from where I live.

Question. Did you ever hear him discuss the question of rebellion?

Answer. I never heard him express himself in any way.
