Question. Do you know whether there was any cheering, groaning, hissing or any demonstrations of any kind, at Ady's when that flag was raised?

Answer. I did not hear any.

Question. Where were you at the time?

Answer. I was up there.

Question. Was there any speaking at that time by any

body?

Answer. There was speaking at the hall by, I think, Mr. Yellott; I do not recollect whether there was any speaking in the open air; there was a fight at Ady's porch, and I went down there. art s both and pod a growan A
