Question by the Committee. Did I understand you to say that you were at Ady's Hotel at the time the news of the first battle of Bull Run was announced?

Answer. I was at my own porch; the news was read on my porch, on the Monday evening after the battle of Bull Run.

Question by the Committee. Mr. Grason was not there, was

he?

Answer. No; Mr. Grason was not there.

Direct examination resumed.

Question. At either of these flag-raisings, of which you speak, and at which you say you saw Mr. Butler, and you think, Dr. Bosley and Mr. Ady, were any of them in uniform?

Answer. No; they had ceased to wear uniforms?

Question. At any of these flag-raisings, there was no members of the Baltimore County Horse Guards in uniform, were they?

Answer. No; I think not.
