Question. Did you see them under arms at any time?

Answer. I saw them drill there.

Question. How long before the raising of the flag, did you see them drilling—within ten (10) days?

Answer. Not that I recollect.

Question. What was the time you saw them drill?

Answer. In the Spring.

Question. Do you remember there was some disturbance in Baltimore about the 19th of April?

Answer. Yes.

Question. Did you see them drill after that?

Answer. Not that I recollect.

Question. At the time you did see them drill, how long before the 19th of April was it?

Answer. I do not know.

Question. Do you remember the inauguration of Mr. Lincoln as President of the United States?

Answer. Yes.

Question. Did these occasions, when you saw them drill, take place before or after that inauguration?

Answer. I don't recollect.

Question. Do you remember who were in command of that company at the time you saw them drill?

Answer. Merryman was one, Mr. Ridgely, of Hampton, was one; Mr. Grason was one, Mr. George Carman was one.

Question. And Harry Gilmore?

Answer. Yes.

## Direct examination resumed.

Question. Was Gilmore an officer or not?
Answer. An officer, as well as I can recollect; I did not take particular notice.

The examination of this witness was here concluded.

WM. H. Ruby, called as a witness for the Respondent, being sworn, testified as follows:

Question. State your name, age, residence and business?
Answer. My name is Wm. H. Ruby, I am 34 years old, reside at Towsontown, and am editor of the "Maryland Journal" published there.

Question. How long have you known Mr. Grason? Answer. Ever since he has been in Towsontown. Question. How long have you lived in Towsontown?

Answer. Since May 1854, eleven (11) years.

Question. During the month of April, 1861, where were you employed?
