

*Direct examination resumed.*

Question. Did your company have any companys colors?

Answer. No; I never saw any.

*The examination in chief of this witness was here concluded.*

SARAH A. WHITTER, called as a witness for the Respondent, being duly sworn, testified as follows:

Question. State your name and residence?

Answer. There was a great crowd came from Towsontown; I don't know who they were; we were on the porch; and heard the rebels were coming and ran down to see them; I was by Mr. Grason's side all the time he was there.
