Question. Did Mr. Grason make any inquiry with reference to his brother?

Answer. None at all.

Question. Was Mrs. Grason out there?

Answer. She came out, too.

Question. Did Mrs. Grason inquire after any person in Virginia?

Answer. Not that I know.

Question. Was there any inquiry in reference to Harry Gilmor—whether or not that was his company, or anything of that sort?

Answer. There was some inquiry: I don't know anything about it; I think I heard some one ask if Major Gilmor was in Towsontown.

Question. Did you only see two (2) scouts? Answer. There were only two (2) there.

Question. Did you hear Mr. Grason reprimand that servant for carrying out the milk to them?

Answer. I don't know about that.

Question. Were you on the porch when they first came up? Answer. I was on the porch when they told us the rebels had come.

Question. Who told you? Answer. Our colored girl.

Question. Where was Mr. Grason?

Answer. He was on his porch. I started first, and after I had been there a few minutes Mr. Grason came out.

The examination of this witness was here concluded,

Susan R. Hunt, called as a witness for the Respondent, being duly sworn, testified as follows:

Question. State your name and residence?

Answer. My name is Susan R. Hunt. I reside at Towson-town.

Question. Whose daughter are you?

Answer. Mr. Wiley Hunt's.

Question. Were you present at the raising of the flag by the ladies, on the 29th of April, 1861?

Answer. Yes. I was one of the ladies that had hold of the rope.

Question. Do you know Mr. Kone-Henry Kone?

Answer. Yes.

Question. Did you ever say to him or to any one in his presence, that you saw Mr. Grason at Ady's Hotel on that occasion, take off his hat and wave it?

Answer. No; not that I remember.

Question. Did you, in point of fact, see Mr. Grason on that occasion?

Answer. No.
