Question. You were a member of the Towson Guards, were you not?

Answer. Yes.

Question. Did the Baltimore County Horse Guards, at any time, have their meetings in the Odd Fellow's Hall?

Answer. Yes; they organized in there.

Question. The same place the Towson Guards had their meetings?

Answer. Yes.

Question. They were separate and distinct organizations, were they not?

Answer. Yes.

Question. Did you know of any ill-feeling existing between them?

Answer. No; not as a company.

*Cross-examination*

Question. When you say there was no ill-feeling, do you mean that there was no sharp political difference between the two (2) companies?

Answer. There was political difference between some few of the company, as individuals.

Question. About the 19th of April, what was the understanding with reference to their position—that they were on the same side, working together;

Answer. I rather think not.

Question. What was the difference between the two.

Answer. The Horse Guards appeared to be in hostility to the men stationed at Cockeysville.

Question. What was the position of the Towson Guards?

Answer. They were not called out for anything.

Question. Then the two (2) companies were not acting in harmony at that time?

Answer. They were not acting together.
