Question. Was that a time of some considerable excitement?

Answer. No; there was not much excitement.

Question. Immediately after the 19th of April, or soon after that day was the Union flag, which had previously been upon that pole, suppressed or taken down?

Answer. It was taken down the Sunday following the 19th of April.

Question. About how long between that and the raising of the Union flag, again?

Answer. I cannot say.

Question. In the interval was there any flags flying at Towsontown?

Answer. Yes: a flag at Mr. Ady's Hotel.

Question. Were there some pretty decided Union men at Towsontown, at that time?

Answer. Yes.

Question. Was there not among these men pretty general regret, pretty decidedly expressed regarding the suppression of that flag?

Answer. I think they took it down themselves.

Question. Was there any regret at the suppression of that flag, which was pretty decidedly expressed, during the time it was down?
