Answer. No; I did not.

*Cross-examination.*

Question. Were the circumstances attending the raising of the second flag a good deal talked of in the Potomac Home Brigade?

Answer. No: there were very few men in the regiment from that place.

Question. Did you, during that interval, hear the incidents attending the flag-raising much discussed between the time they were raised and the last fortnight?

Answer. No: I did not.

*By the Committee.*

*Question by the Committee.* If such demonstrations had occurred, don't you think you would have been likely to have heard of them?

Answer. I conscientiously believe if there had been anything of the kind I would have heard of it; almost every one there would have heard of it—it would have amounted to a fuss or a riot.

*Question by the Committee.* Then you were not down at Mr. Ady's when this flag-raising took place?

Answer. Part of the time I might have been forty (40) yards, part of the time within speaking distance.

*Question by the Committee.* Your attention was more attracted towards the flag-raising than to Mr. Ady's house, was it not?

Answer. It was attracted towards the whiskey there at Ady's house. I expected if there had been any fuss, that would be where it would be.

*Cross-examination resumed.*

Question. You were not there at all, any where in the vicinity of the raising of the first flag?

Answer. No: I was not in the village.
