

*Direct examination resumed.*

Question. You say that you saw two men from the county come down with badges on, they were Union men last November at the time Mr. Grason was elected?

Answer. Yes.

*By the Committee.*

*Question by the Committee.* What evidence have you of that?

Answer. One of them is Provost Marshal under the Government; they acted with the Union party.

*Question by the Committee.* How did they vote?

Answer. I don't know; one of them is in the army now; he has been badly wounded; he is a pretty good man.

*Direct examination resumed.*

Question. What is his name?

Answer. Lieut. Conner of the 7th Maryland.

Question. You say Mr. Grason run as candidate for State's Attorney, did he run as independent candidate or party candidate?

Answer. I can't tell that; I think they all came out as independent without a convention, in opposition to the Union nomination, and Mr. Grason was candidate for State's Attorney, and Mr. Carman for Clerk; they had no candidates for the Legislature, just for county officers; Mr. Ensor was the regular nominee.

Question. There was no organization that you know of in opposition?

Answer. No public organization.

Question. Do you know what General Wyncoop did with that badge which you gave him?

Answer. No; he was in command of the forces at Cockeysville; I went over there to see the soldiers and gave it to him.

*Cross-examination resumed.*

Question. Had that badge, which you saw worn in addition to the coat-of-arms of Maryland, the words the Southern Rights or the Southern Confederacy?

Answer. I would not like to say now: some had, but I don't know about that badge of mine; I took it more as a curiosity than anything else.
