Question by the Committee Was not the road picketed from Towsontown in an opposite direction from Baltimore?

Answer. Yes, above Towsontown, between Towsontown

and Cockeysville.

Question by the Committee. That was not to keep the communication between Towsontown and Baltimore was it?

Answer. I said between the county and Baltimore, not be-

tween Towsontown and Baltimore.

Question by the Committee. Were you on picket duty at any time?

Answer. Yes, twice.

Question by the Committee. Where were they stationed?
Answer. The first time I was up as far as Texas, near Cockeysville, one afternoon for two (2) or three (3) hours.

Question by the Committee. What were your instructions? Answer. I had none. I went there and sat on the fence, and came back when my time was up.

Question by the Committee. What time? Answer. Two (2) or three (3) hours.

Question by the Committee. Did you have your arms? Answer. Yes.

$Cross-examination\ resumed.$

Question. What officer stationed you there?
Answer. I don't remember. I was sent out as several others. I don't know that I had any special instructions.

$By \ the \ Committee.$

Question by the Committee. Do you remember any other duty your company was performing other than keeping up the communication spoken of?

Answer. I don't know that there is anything else.

Question by the Committee. Communication between the city and county?

Answer. Yes.

Question by the Committee. You have no knowledge why it

was desirous to keep up that communication?

Answer. There were some soldiers up above Cockeysville, who came down there, and there was great excitement; crowds coming up from Baltimore, and the soldiers were stationed along the road to prevent a disturbance.

Question by the Committee. Disturbance between whom?

Answer. Any disturbance that came in their way. Question by the Committee. Among the people?

Answer. Yes; great crowds coming out the roads all the time; I suppose they were stationed there to act under the orders of the Sheriff.
