

*Direct examination resumed.*

Question. Do you know how long it remained there?

Answer. I do not.

Question. Were you a member of that organization?

Answer. I was not.

*The examination in chief of this witness was here concluded.*

*Cross-examination.*

Question. Where is General Steuart of whom you speak?

Answer. I can only give you what report says, not of my own knowledge; report says he is in the Southern Confederacy?

Question. How long is it since you have seen Gen. Steuart in Baltimore?

Answer. I have not seen him since the day I saw him in his office, on the 19th of April, 1861.

Question. Prior to that time were you in the habit of seeing him frequently?

Answer. Quite often.

Question. Have you any knowledge of any orders issued by Governor Hicks on or about that day?

Answer. None other than that which I have stated of the party professing to be his Aid-de-Camp.

Question. Did you see the flag of which you have spoken as having been thrown from the window of the association called "the Minute Men?"

Answer. Yes.

Question. For how long a time?

Answer. For one day.

Question. What day was that?

Answer. To the best of my recollection it was the 19th of April.

Question. Did you ever see it subsequently?

Answer. No.

Question. Did you ever see that organization under arms on any occasion whatever?

Answer. I never saw them under arms.

Question. What did you say was the purpose under which General Steuart was told to call out the militia?

Answer. For the purpose of suppressing riot and insurrection.

Question. Have you any knowledge whether there were any rioters in the city at that time?

Answer. Only from report.
