Question. Where was the armory of the City Guards?

Answer. Corner of Baltimore and Gay streets.

Question. Can you tell what company was in Apollo Hall the 21st of April?

Answer. The Law Greys. It was their armory.

Question. Who was directing the military movements as far as you saw. Who was the military commander of the city at that time?

Answer. My knowledge of them was very limited; I looked up to Col. Warner, who was my Colonel; he is now dead.

Question. Who was the second in command?

Answer. Major Parks.

*Direct examination resumed.*

Question. Were you Deputy Marshal of the Minute Men?

Answer. Yes: Assistant Marshal. I was one of the first who organized the Association.

*The examination of this witness was here concluded.*

DAVID E. WOODBURN, called a witness for the Respondent, being duly sworn, testified as follow:

Question. State your name, residence and business?

Answer. My name is David E. Woodburn; I reside in Baltimore; I am agent for the P. W. & B. R. R.

Question. Were you in Baltimore in the Spring of 1861?

Answer. Yes.

Question. Were you connected with any military organization?

Answer. Yes; the Baltimore City Guards.

Question. What position?

Answer. I had command of Company D. The regiment was afterwards reorganized and I was Colonel.

Question. Were you on duty during that time?

Answer. On the 19th of April; I was at the depot at the time the difficulty happened. I heard that there was a good deal of excitement up town; I started up, when I got as far as Gay street I met Col. Warner, who said the armory had been threatened by the mob; he requested me to get my
