came back I found the company still not ordered out; the men were anxious to be under arms. I made the remark to Captain Chew that to satisfy the men, he had better call them out and place them upon picket duty, which I believe he did.

Question. Do you know how long they peformed that duty?

Answer. I believe they were on duty a week.

Question. Were they supplied with any munitions of war during that time?

Answer. Yes; cartridges and ball caps.

Question. What quantity?

Answer. I disremember the quantity now. It was several hundred.

Question. Where did they come from?

Answer. I received the order from General Trimble, and they were gotten from Marshal Kane's office on Monday.

Question. Who brought that ammunition for the Towson

Guards to Towsontown?

Answer. I did.

Question. Was there any one with you?

Answer. No.

Question. What was done with that ammunition?

Answer. It was placed in the armory under the care of Sergeant George. The company disbanded after a time, and I took part of it home; I don't know where the rest of it went.

Question. Did you understand that your company, the Towson Guards, were acting in hostility to the Baltimore County Horse Guards?

Answer. No.

Question. Did you know of any hostility existing between them as companies?

Answer. No: I knew of hostility between them as mem-

bers.

Question. Were you at any flag-raisings?

Answer. No.

Question. Did a portion of the Towson Guards board at Ady's hotel during that time?

Answer. Yes.

The examination in chief of this witness was here concluded.

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## Cross-examination.

Question. Do you know whether the Horse Guards received any ammunition or arms?

Answer. I do not.

Question. Did you have any interview with Kane? Answer. No; I did not see him.
