Question by the Committee. Opposed as democrats and whigs, or democrats and know-nothings?

Answer. As democrats and know-nothings.

Question by the Committee. Was there or not, any apprehension about that time, of any turbulant characters coming out from Baltimore?

Answer. Yes; I think that was the time these deputy sher-

iff's were appointed.

Question by the Committee. Were those notices not served in reference to the disturbance of the peace?

Answer. Yes; that is the way I understood it.

Question by the Committee. Had any of these people, coming from Baltimore, caused any disturbance in Towsontown?

Answer. I know of no other except those that were arres-

ted.

Question by the Committee. Were you in Towsontown the 21st of April?

Answer. Yes.

Question. Were there any persons in or about, creating a disturbance?

Answer. Yes; I saw some parties come out in a hack.

Question by the Committee. Were you present when the

Union flag was taken down, on that day?

Answer. No; I was there a portion of the day, but not when the flag was taken down; there were some riotous persons at Towsontown that day; they talked pretty loud, and drew a crowd; they were on the way to Cockeysville.

Cross-examination resumed.

Question. What were the political parties or differences in existence at Towsontown, in the winter of 1860-61 and the spring of 1861?

Answer. I think the know-nothing party and the demo-

cratic party.

Question. When did that cease to be the point of difference?

Answer. I don't know about that.

Question. When did you first hear of the lines being drawn of Union and Secession?

Answer. About the 19th of April?

Question. Was not the matter discussed until the 19th of April?

Answer. Yes; I think after the candidates for the Presidency came out, it was frequently discussed.
