Answer. I did not hear any cheering about my house; with the exception of the cheering at the pole.

Question. Was there no response by the persons at your

house?

Answer. None that I heard of.

Question. Were you in a position to see any persons about your house?

Answer. Not outside.

Question. How far back from the window were you sitting the first time?

Answer. I don't recollect much about it.

Question. Were those men under arms there at Towsontown during the week that followed the 19th of April?

Question. For what purpose?

Answer. I do not know.

Question. Were you under arms yourself?

Answer. Yes.

Question. Do you know in hostility to what power you were acting?

Answer. No; I don't.

Question. Do you know whether the persons in command of those companies were upholders of the Government or not? Answer. I could not say; I never heard them express any opinion either way.

Question. Did you see any troops in the vicinity of Cockeys-

ville about that time?

Answer. No.

Question. Did not the men under arms during that week openly and often denounce the Government of the United States and its authorities?

Answer. I cannot say I ever heard them.

Question. Did you hear any of those persons connected with the military organization, cursing Lincoln and the Black Republican Government?

Answer. I cannot say that I did.

Question. Did you hear them at any time when under arms? Answer. No.

Question. Did you hear Mr. Grason express himself at all with reference to the Government?

Answer. No.

Question. Did you hear Harry Gilmor?

Answer. Not at the time the company was under arms.
