

Question. Where were you upon the Monday evening when the rebels were in Towsontown?

Question. Did your father go home with you?

Answer. No; he did not go home with me.

Question. Which way did you go home?

Answer. Up the pike road—the Joppa Road; the other children went up the plank road—we all went home.

Question. What became of your father?

Answer. He went home; we all went home.

Question. Did you know what troops they were, were they near you when you were standing there first?

Answer. No, I did not; I stood there some ten (10) minutes, before I knew who they were.

Question. After you returned home on Monday night, did you go directly into the house, or remain standing outside?

Answer. I remained out back of the house to see the confederates pass.

Question. Did you go in?

Answer. Father came round there and made us go in.

Question. What time in the evening was it, on Sunday, that the rebels came?

Answer. It was about 4 or 5 o'clock.

Question. Had you heard they were coming before you saw them there?

Answer. No.

Question. Did you know either of those pickets that you went up there with?

Answer. I did not go with any, I went after they had gone; about five (5) minutes after they had gone up.

Question. Where was it that your brother Johnny met them?

Answer. He was not with me on Mr. Lee's porch; he was in Towsontown.
