Question. Had any of those on Monday night the Union uniform on?

Answer. I could not distinguish the uniforms very well.

Question. About what time was it that your father sent
Johnnie to bed?

Answer. After they were gone.

Question. Did he stay out there until they went away?

Answer. He stayed out there with father.

Question. Did Johnnie or yourself go into the house before they went away?

Answer. No; I stood there with father.

Question. Were you sent into the house by your father after they had gone away.

Answer. No.

Question. Had they asked for anything before that milk was brought out to them?

Answer. No; the cook gave it to them voluntarily.

Question. Did your father say anything to her for giving it to them?

Answer. I didn't know anything about it until they had all gone.

Question. Did they drink the milk?

Answer. Two (2) of them did.

Question. Did they ask for anything else?

Answer. No.

Question. Did they go up towards Mr. Roberts?

Answer. No; they did not. Mr. Roberts was in Towson-town; they went back and talked to him there.

Question. Were they told at your father's that he was in

Towsontown?

Answer. I don't know; I think they were.

Question. Do you know Mr. Roberts? Answer. Yes; I know him by sight.

Question. How do you know that he was in Towsontown?

Answer. I went back to Towsontywn afterwards.

Question. Did your father go back?

Answer. No; he did not.

Question. Do you know whether there has been more than one battle called the battle of Bull Run?

Answer. Yes.

Question. Which battle do you speak of?

Answer. The first.

Question. Do you know where your father was at the time of the second battle of Bull Run?

Answer. I don't remember.

Question. How do you fix this, of which you speak, when you heard the cannonading, at the first battle of Bull Run?
