*Question by the Committee.* Did you say that Mr. Ensor testified?

Question. Can you distinguish what was said by Mr. Thompson from what was said by every other person who testified?

Answer. I cannot remember all the evidence, but I am perfectly satisfied that if there had been any evidence that would go to convict a party I should remember it.

Question. To convict a person under that treason act was the question?

Answer. Treason and perjury.

Question. Did you have repeated conversations with Judge Grason during that term of Court?

Answer. I had repeated conversations with him during that session of the grand jury, but not with reference to the grand jury.

Question. Did you, at any time, have a conversation with reference to the charge which had been made against him, that if the State did not secede he would?

Answer. I had a conversation with the Judge at his own house, and we got upon the subject of loyalty and disloyalty, and the Judge, in the course of that conversation, said that was the only expression anybody ever heard him say; it was that expression which was said here before the Committee, that he made in the Clerk's room.

*Question by the Committee.* Did you, while a jurymen, make several calls at Judge Grason's house, in the morning before you went to the grand jury?

Answer. I did.

*Question by the Committee.* For what purpose?

Answer. Judge Grason and myself were always intimate friends.
