

Answer. I have been on intimate terms with him, but I never visited him much.

Question. Do you know any man in Baltimore county who has not been a Union man?

Answer. Yes, I do ; a good many.

*Direct examination resumed.*

Question. Did you ever hear Mr. Grason express any disloyal sentiments?

Answer. No.

Question. Did you ever hear him express any sympathy with the rebellion, or any wish for the success of the Confederate armies?

Answer. I never did.

*Cross-examination resumed.*

Question. But you said you never had any conversation with him on that subject?

Answer. That is the very reason ; I heard Mr. Grason, in a speech at the Court House, say that he would like to see the stars and stripes flying over every inch of ground in this country.

Question. When did he say that?

Answer. In January, 1865.

Question. Did you ever hear Mr. Grason make any remarks sustaining or upholding the Government or its policy?

Answer. I think I heard him say he did not wish to see this country destroyed.

Question. When was that?

Answer. Over a year ago.

Question. Was it four (4) years ago?

Answer. No.

*The examination of this witness was here concluded.*

LEWIS H. WHEELER, re-called by the Respondent.

Question. Mr. Longnecker has testified that he was editor of the "Baltimore County American;" was there upon the 20th of April of 1861, an extra issued by that paper?

Answer. Yes.
