Samuel F. Butler, called as a witness for the Respondent, being duly sworn testified as follows:

Question. State your name, residence and business?

Answer. My name is Samuel F. Butler, I reside at Towsontown, I am a carpenter.

Question. You were for a time Register of Wills, were you

not?

Answer. Yes, I was appointed in 1862, and served until the following Fall, about thirteen (13) months.

Question. Were you present at the raising of the flag at

Towsontown in April, 1861?

Answer. I think I was, I will not be positive. When the new flag was put up I know I was there, I think I was there the first one.

Question. At any flag raising at Towsontown in 1861, did

you see Mr. Grason present?

Answer. No.

Question. At any flag raising at Towsontown in 1861, did you hear any cheering for Jeff Davis or the Southern Confederacy or any groans and hissing at Ady's Hotel?

Answer. No, nor at any other time.

Question. How long have you resided in Towsontown?

Answer. About nine (9) years.

Question. When did you first hear of any such cheers, groans or hissing having taken place at any flag raising?

Answer. Not until since this trial.

Question. Have you resided in Towsontown all the time since and did you reside there at that time?

Answer. Yes.

Question. You have never heard of any such occurrences until this trial?

Answer. No.

The examination in chief of this witness was here concluded.
