Question. Had they any difficulty?

Answer. At the second flag raising not at the first.

Question. You say that it was either Saturday or Sunday that the Baltimore County Horse Guards received orders to go and take Fort McHenry?

Answer. Yes.

Question. Do you know whose orders they were?

Answer. No.

Question. From whom did you get your information that

they were ordered to take Fort McHenry?

Answer. It was the general talk around the neighborhood of Towsontown that they had received orders to go and take Fort McHenry.

Question. Can you name the persons who made this state-

Question. Could you name any one of them?

Answer. No, I do not think I could.

Question. Captain Chew said he was anxious to have orders, did he?
