PARADES—Company.

Sect. 71.—Every independent company of the National Guard, besides its meetings for company drill shall, so long as it is not incorporated in any battalion or regiment, parade at least four times in every year, between the first day of May and the first day of December, on such day, and at such place as the commander thereof may direct, public notice of which shall be given by said commander ten days before the day appointed by advertisement set up at the company rendezvous, and published in some newspaper of general circulation within said district.

Other Parades.

Sect. 72.—Every regiment, battalion and squadron of the National Guard shall parade for the purpose of discipline, inspection and review, at least four times in every year between the first day of May and the first day of December, on such day and at such place as the commanding officers thereof respectively may designate, public notice of which, when such organizations have been formed outside of the city of Baltimore, shall be given for three weeks before the day so appointed in all the newspapers printed within the counties to which the companies forming said organizations belong, or when in the city of Baltimore, by advertisement inserted three times in each of two newspapers having general circulation in said city.

Sect. 73.—Brigade and division parades will be ordered from time to time by the generals commanding, and due public notice given of the times and places of said parades.

Disorder at Parades.

Sect. 74.—Any member of the National Guard, or other person, who shall disobey any order, or interrupt the orderly discharge of duty of those under arms, may be placed under guard for the day, by order of the commanding officer thereof, who may also prohibit any gambling or the sale of any spirituous liquors on or about the ground of said parade. And the party so offending shall in addition be liable to a penalty of not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars.

Absentees.

Sect. 75.—At each parade the rolls shall be called within one hour after the time designated for the meeting, and the names of all absentees noted.

ASSESSMENT OF FINES.

S cr. 76.—Against every private or musician so absent, there shall be assessed a fine of two dollars, against every non-commissioned officer a fine of three dollars, and against every commissioned officer, a fine of five dollars.
