

And in such cases, each officer shall receive in addition to his usual pay, seventy-five cents per day, each non-commissioned officer and private, fifty cents per day, and every member of a mounted company shall receive, in addition, two dollars per day, which shall include keeping and forage for horses.

*Camps of Instruction.*

SECT. 191.—A camp of instruction will be ordered once in each year, in each of the division or brigade districts of this State, as the commander-in-chief may direct, which shall be held at such time and place and in such manner as may be directed; and in case suitable ground cannot be found in any district for said camp, the same may be held in the adjoining district.

SECT. 192.—Such camps shall continue for a period not exceeding ten days, and shall be governed by the rules and regulations of the United States.

*Garrison Duty.*

SECT. 193.—The commander-in-chief may, from time to time, order such regiments, battalions, batteries or companies, without regard to arm, as he may select, to such forts, works, or other places as may be furnished by the United States Government, or as may be convenient for that purpose, for a period not exceeding ten days in any one year, for instruction in garrison duty and in the exercise of heavy artillery, under such instructors as may be assigned for that purpose.

*Camps and Garrisons—How Officered.*

SECT. 194.—The commander-in-chief will designate commissioned officers of proper rank, without regard to military districts, to command such camps, forts or other places, and will assign such other officers, also without regard to military districts, to duty as field and staff officers and instructors, as may be required to fully officer such camps and forts, and supply all deficiencies that may exist in the complete organization of the troops quartered therein.

*How Supplied.*

SECT. 195.—The quarter master general shall, upon the requisition of the commander-in-chief, furnish such camp and garrison equipage as may be required for the use of the troops so encamped or stationed, and shall also furnish transportation, whenever the same is necessary for conveying said troops to and from such camps or stations.

SECT. 196.—The commissary general shall, upon like requisition, provide subsistence for such troops, to conform in price and quantity to the ration prescribed by the general
