State of Maryland deplores the loss of a most valuable public officer, and a highly valued and useful citizen, whose memory will be cherished by the State and her people with a grateful sense of his public services and private virtues.

Resolved, That as a further testimony of our appreciation of the deceased and our respect for his memory, the members of the two Houses of the General Assembly, attend his funeral in a body, and that the national ensign be displayed at half-mast from the dome of the State House until the conclusion of the funeral services.

Resolved, That the aforegoing report and resolutions be entered upon the Journal of the two Houses, and a copy of them be transmitted to the family of the deceased.
