Ans. Some four or five different interviews we have had during that time in regard to political affairs.

In 1861, after the flag was raised (the secession flag) at Clarksville. I come across Dr. Maclin, and I asked him what he thought of the State of affairs of our country; the Dr. observed that it was a cruel thing, and to secession he was bitterly opposed and the south was entirely too fast.

The next time I met him was in his office during the year 1861, he said then he was sorry to see the condition of our country, and still detested secession. The next interview was about the time of the election the fall of 1861.

Then a number crowded around me at the polls, Dr. Maclin a little way off and beginning on politics. I impeached them for being secessionists and said they were broken down politicians, then I looked around the crowd and saw Dr. Maclin and said here you have Dr. Maclin at your back, and the Dr. came up to me and said: "I haven't said a word against you," and the Dr. also said "you dont know any secession about me," and I said no but I bring you in the club with the others, this I said jocularly.

The next interview Dr. Maclin came to my house in the fall of 1863.

He then solicited me in regard to voting and denounced secession very strongly.

The next interview was in 1864, at the last election: He then spoke in regard to the parties and appeared to me that the Southern Government was too fast, and Lincoln was too fast in some things and both were to be blamed. In the first interview he was opposed to the action in Baltimore on the 19th of April, and also to the action at Clarksville of raising the rebel flag.
