the 5th section of the 8th article of the Code of Public General Laws, and the 741, 742 and 743 sections of the 4th article of the Code of Public Local Laws of this State, in relation to the uniformed and ununiformed militia and volunteer force in the several counties of this State and in the city of Baltimore, and the reclamation, custody, control, and re-delivery of arms heretofore delivered to the officers and men under them; and to add to the said 63d article of the Code of Public General Laws a section providing for the prevention and suspension of proceedings upon bonds heretofore given under the laws of this State for the return of such arms.
