Mr. Eichelberger, from the committee on Corporations, reported a bill entitled, An act to indemnify and protect J. R. Kenly, and G. R. Dodge, successive provost marshals, in the city of Baltimore, and the police force under their command, from all prosecutions for acts done in the discharge of their official duties:

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Eichelberger, from the committee on Corporations, to which was referred the bill entitled, An act to provide for the payment of the police force now in the service of the United States, in the city of Baltimore, reported said bill ought not to pass, and

The bill was rejected.

Mr. Sellman, from the committee on Finance, to which was referred the bill entitled, An act to release William Delahay, former sheriff of Caroline county, from the payment of a balance appearing upon the books of the Comptroller of the Treasury to be due by him, reported it without amendment.

The bill was read the second time, and

On motion of Mr. Sellman,

Three-fourths of all the Senators concurring,

Was read the third time.

The hour having arrived, for considering the Order of the Day;

On motion of Mr. Briscoe,

It was postponed to 1 o'clock.

On motion of Mr. Whitaker,

The bill was recommitted to the committee on Finance.

Mr. Smith from the committee on Finance, to which was referred the bill entitled, An act to amend the 56th article of the Code of Public General Laws, relating to licenses by adding thereto the following sections, requiring the sheriff of the several counties and Baltimore city to report an alphabetical list of the persons required to take out licenses, reported said bill ought not to pass.

The question upon concurring in the report was determined in the affirmative, by yeas and nays, as follow:
