

Mr. Goldsborough, of Dorchester, from the committee on Printing, submitted the following

REPORT:

The committee on Printing beg leave to report that they have contracted with Messrs. Schley & Cole, of Frederick city, for the printing of five hundred copies of the Journal of the Senate and the Accompanying Documents, from the beginning of the present extra Session to the end of the ensuing regular Session, at a cost of one dollar and fifty cents per page of fourteen hundred and fifty ems, also one hundred and thirty copies of all bills and reports for the sum of one dollar per page of fourteen hundred and fifty ems. Tabular work to be charged for at double the above mentioned prices. And the said Schley & Cole have agreed to furnish one hundred and thirty copies of the Senate Journal each day, without compensation, said copies to be distributed by them in conformity with the provisions of the Code of Public General Laws, relating to the public printing.

The work to be executed promptly and in a style, at least, equal to that of the printing of the last Senate of Maryland.

The said Schley & Cole have entered into bond to the State of Maryland, approved by the Treasurer of the State, in the penalty of one thousand dollars, for the faithful performance of the above contract.

The committee further report that they have contracted with Henry M. Murray, Esq., for the preparation of an index to the Journal of the Senate, for the present extra, and the ensuing regular Session, and for the supervision of the proof sheets of the same, for the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars. Said index to be completed within ten days after the adjournment of the General Assembly, on the 10th of March next.
