referred to the committee on Finance; that so much thereof as refers to the condition of St. John's College, be referred to the committee on Education; that so much thereof as refers to the case of Emanuel Myers, be referred to the committee on Finance; and that so much thereof as refers to the correspondence between the Executive Department and Commissioners from certain of the States now in rebellion against our Government, be referred to the committee on Federal Relations.

Mr. Eichelberger submitted the following message:

By the Senate, .

January 3d, 1862.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates:

We respectfully propose to your Honorable Body the appointment of a committee of three to act in conjuntion with a committee of two, appointed by the Senate, to report a bill providing for the taking of the oath of allegiance by all persons holding any office or position of profit or trust under the Constitution or any public or private law of this State.

The Senate has appointed Messrs. Eichelberger and Firey as the committee on the part of the Senate.
