So the amendment was rejected.

Mr. Hammond, of Frederick, proposed the following:

At the end of the 4th section, add:

"Or to a fine of not less than five hundred, or more than three thousand dollars, at the discretion of the court;"

Which was adopted.

Mr. Johnson, of Baltimore county, proposed to amend by striking out the words "the United States or of," in the 72d line, sub-section 7;

Which was adopted.

Mr. Creswell proposed to amend by striking out all after word "prohibited," in line 88, sub-section 8, and insert:

"And if such offence be committed, the said person who so seduced, enticed or persuaded shall, on conviction, be sentenced to suffer such punishment, as the person committing said offence, would be liable to suffer as a punishment for the crime so committed by him;"

Which was adopted.

Mr. Johnson, of Baltimore county, proposed to amend by inserting after the word "prohibited," in line 81 sub-section 9, the words "though such offence has not been committed;"

Which was adopted.

Mr. Purnell proposed to amend by inserting an additional sub-section after sub-section 9, as follows:

"Sub-section 10. Any person or persons within this State, who shall surrender or betray, or be in any way concerned in surrendering or betraying any military post, fortification, arsenal or military stores of this State, into the possession or power of any enemies of this State, or shall supply arms or ammunition or military stores to such enemies; or who shall unlawfully and without authority, usurp possession and control of any military post, fortification, arsenal or military stores; every person so offending, and being legally convicted thereof shall be guilty of a high misdemeanor, and shall be sentenced to confinement in the penitentiary for a term not less than two years nor more than four years, or be fined not less than five hundred nor more than one thousand dollars, or both at the discretion of the court;

Which was rejected.
