

Also, returned the following House bills, entitled respectively:

An act to amend section 292, of article 93, of the Code of Public General Laws, entitled, Testamentary Law, providing that in all cases of administration, the widow shall have the right to take and apply to her own use a certain amount of the personal property;

An act to amend the 21st and 22d sections, of the 56th article, of the Code of Public General Laws, relating to the licenses of hawkers and pedlars;

An act to repeal an act entitled, a further additional supplement to an act entitled, An act to establish and incorporate a Medical and Chirurgical Faculty or Society in the State of Maryland, passed at June session, 1861, chapter 42, and re-enact the same with amendments;

An act for the relief of the families of those of the Massachusetts Sixth Regiment of Volunteers, who were killed or wounded in the riot of the 19th of April, 1861, at Baltimore;

Severally endorsed, "passed by yeas and nays."

The hour of 12 M. having arrived, the Honorable, the Speaker, announced the election of a United States Senator as the Order of the Day.

Mr. Davis, of Montgomery, submitted the following message:

By the House of Delegates,

Gentlemen of the Senate :

The hour having arrived for going into the election of United States Senator, to succeed the Hon. Anthony Kennedy, we propose to proceed at once with the election.

We nominate the Hon. Reverdy Johnson, of Baltimore county, for that office.

The roll was then called, sixty-four members responding and voting.
