to Congress of the wards of Baltimore city, from the first to the fifteenth inclusive, shall make a return separate from the return to be made by the return judges of the remaining wards;"

Which was rejected.

The bill was then by special order, three-fourths concurring, read the third time and passed by yeas and nays as follow:
