

An act to authorise the burgess and commissioners of Emmittsburg, to levy additional taxes for the purpose of making an artificial road of stone or sand on the streets of said corporation;

An act to repeal sections 118, 119, 120, 121, 122, 123, 124, 125, 126, 127, 128, 129, 130, 131, 132 and 133, of article 12, of the Code of Public Local Laws, under the title of sheep;

An act to regulate the inspection of wheat flour, rye flour and corn meal in the city of Baltimore, and to prevent frauds on purchasers;

An act to amend the 11th section, of the 71st article, of the Code of Public General Laws of Maryland, relating to the catching or taking of oysters;

An act to incorporate the Baltimore and Harford Turnpike Company, in Baltimore and Harford counties;

An act to repeal so much of the act of 1840, chapter 86, and of the act of 1836, chapter 261, as allows the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, to exceed the maximum of charges established by the original charter of said company, so far as relates to the transportation of certain articles;

An act to authorise and require the Governor to enforce the penalties provided for by the act of 1812, chapter 78, for the failure of the president and managers of the Washington and Baltimore Turnpike road, to keep said road in good and proper order;

An act to incorporate the Elkridge Landing Bridge Company;

An act to incorporate the trustees of the Methodist Episcopal church in Elkton;

An act to authorise George Bond, a free negro, to return with his family to the State of Maryland;

An act to incorporate the town of Oakland in Allegany county, Maryland;

An act to amend section 11, of article 42, of the Code of Public General Laws, relating to the Governor;

An act to add an additional section to the 74th article of the Code of Public General Laws;

An act to amend section 5, of article 42, of the Code of General Laws, relating to the office of Governor and to amend the same;

An act to amend the 15th section, of article 50, of the Code of Public General Laws, relating to the challenging of jurors;
