Mr. Magruder submitted the following message:

By the House of Delegates,

March 7th, 1862.

Gentlemen of the Senate :

We herewith return to your Honorable Body, House bill "to amend the 18th section, of article 11, of the Code of Public General Laws, relating to State's Attorney. The House concurs in so much of the Senate's amendment as proposes to strike out the word "city" and insert "Criminal," but refuses to concur in that part thereof proposing to insert the word "city" after the word "Baltimore;" as by section 13 of article IV of the Constitution, the title of the court named is "the Criminal Court of Baltimore."
