or device may be used. The plan shall specify a minimum number of names, selected at random, to be placed initially in the master jury wheel, which shall be at least 1/2 of 1 percent of the total number of persons on the lists used as sources of names for the county; but if this number of names is cumbersome and unnecessary, or inadequate, the plan may fix a smaller or larger number of names to be placed in the master wheel. In all cases the number shall be at least 200. The jury judge may order additional names, selected at random, to be placed in the master jury wheel as he considers necessary. The plan shall provide for periodic emptying and refilling of the master jury wheel at specified times and shall assure that this periodic refilling places in the master jury wheel names from voter registration lists used in the general election preceding the time of refilling;

- [(c)] (3) Specify the time when the names drawn from the qualified jury wheel are disclosed to the public. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the name, address, age, sex, education, occupation, and occupation of spouse, of each person whose name is drawn from the qualified jury wheel shall be made public, unless the jury judge determines in any case that the interest of justice requires that this information remain confidential;
- [(d)] (4) Determine the method for allocating names drawn from the qualified jury wheel between the grand and petit juries;
- [(e)] (5) [(1)] (I) Provide for a "juror
 qualification form" which asks each potential juror his:

[(i)] 1. Name, address, age, sex, and

education;

[(ii)] 2. Race, religion, national

origin;

[(iii)] 3. Occupation and occupation of

spouse;

[(iv)] 4. Length of residence within the

county;

[(v)] 5. Prior jury service;

from jury service, has any physical or mental infirmity impairing his capacity to serve as a juror;

[(vii)] 7. If he is able to read, write, speak, and understand the English language;
